


















A 'back to school" will be held at Dandenong State School 1403 on Sat urday, November 19 at 1 p.m.

Dandenong State School, which is believed to be the 'oldest' school in the town was first established in a tent in the Church of England grounds in 1838, the head teacher being a Mr. Roberts


Mr. Roberts.

Organisers of the celebrations hope a large crowd of former teachers and pupils will attend.

Anyone possessing pictures, notebooks, clippings from newspapers, or any relics of former school days is asked to bring them on the day.

Pictures may be left with Mr. Kevin Synot at his store at 260 Thomas St., Dandenong, or at the school with Mr. R. Brown, the head teacher.

Pupils knowing the present address of former classmates are asked to inform them of the afternoon's program and invite them to participate.



Former pupi's of the school are especially asked to attend, and to bring any old photoraghs, newspape; cuttings and note looks to the function, which starts at 1 pm.

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No. 1403 is one of the cldest schools in Dandenons, being opened in June 1880 with Mr. Malcoum Macpherson as the first head teacher. Mr. Mocherson in fact wis the first and only head teacher of the original State School in Dandenong at the corner of Foster and Robinson Sts., on the site of the present Beau Monde building.

This school was built in 1874 at a cost of £621, but with the opening of the railway a few years later the site was considered to be too dangerous for the children, and hence the location on the top of Foster St. was selected.

The land belonged to William Masters,

and many of our present residents will readily recall the Masters peddocks and family hone, which incidentally was only demolishafew years ago to make way for playing areas for the enlarged and expanding school.

The attendance in 1887 was 196, and by 1933 had grown to 400 pupils. For many years the attendance remained fairly static, and it was not until 1954 that more classrooms were required. The present day enrolment is 497.

Apart from Mr. Macpherson, former pupils may recall such names as Captain Wm. White, Mr. G. W. Talbot, Mr. A. Besant, Mr. Towner (who died only recently) and Miss Austin.

A special display of historical photographs will be provided by the Dandenong Historical Society, and in conjunction with the Back to School a farewell will be tendered to Miss Sally Carroll who will retire from the service towards the end of this year

## Farewell to a popular teacher

At the 'Back to Dandenong State School 1403' celebrations on November 19, attended by 700 former teachers and pupils, opportunity was taken to officially farewell Miss Sally Carroll who has been a popular member of the staff for 17 years, Miss Carroll retires on December

well-known Carroll family whose name has been synonymous with Dandenong since 1880.

Miss Carroll began her career as a junior teacher at Noble Park State School on August 4 1919. In 1920 she transferred

to Dandenong State School 1403.

Her first appointment as a classified teacher was to Linga, a school established shortly after the virgin Mallee was opened up. Other appointments have been at Willowmarin, Warrnambool, Mornington, Portland, Wandin, Yallock Birchip, Drysdale, Springvale, Caulfield and then again to Dandenong.

In addition to the permanent appointments. she served as a relieving teacher at Rushworth Higher Elementary School, Rutherglen Higher Elementary School Footseray, Kangaroo Flat, Yallourn, Colac, Hawthorn, and Roch-

Mr. R. W. Brown, the head teacher, officiating at the formal presentation ceremony, paid a glowing tribute to Miss Carroll for her skill as a teacher, her deep understanding of children, particularly her interest and sympathy to those who found learning difficult. and to the underprivi-

She is a member of the while there might be teachers who equalled Miss Carroll in skill and performance, there were none who excelled her.

He also spoke of her ability to master and carry out in the classroom each and every new educational development.

He praised her for her abiding interest in all forms of nature study, in particular her work in fostering a knowledge in her pupils of ornithology. In this field, he said, she had no equal.

He also referred to the sterling work Miss Car-roll had done as leader of the school's Social Service League.

The League supports charities helping underprivileged children or children who are physically handicapped or ill.

The school's work in regard to the League was second to none in the State for a school of its

Mrs. Cooper, president of the Mothers' Club, handed Miss Carroll a sheath of mixed flowers, and the secretary of the school committee presented her on behalf of the school community a mohair travelling rug. Mr. Norfolk emphasised the effection in which Miss Carroll is held by parents and pupils, and thanked her for her long and valued service.

Miss Carroll, in res-ponse outlined some of her experiences as a teacher. She also mentioned with pride that she had attended the East for some years as a pupil, and that her father had donated to the school the massive name plate surmounting the front porch.

"My happiest years have been spent here," she said.



He commended her for her devotion to duty, loyalty to the school, and her meticulous attention at all times to detail.

The District Inspector of Schools Mr. C. G. Stocks, extending best wishes for a long and happy retirement, also paid tribute to Miss Carroll for her excellence as a teacher.
